

Advanced Course Notification

- All districts and charter schools must provide annual notification of advanced coursework offered in middle or high school to parents and students electronically or by mail.
- Options for advanced coursework must also be posted on the district or charter school's website.
- Requirement ensures students and families understand the benefits and opportunities for advanced coursework.
- Student and Parent Notification of Advanced Coursework memo (March 2024)

Students must:

- earn ¼ credit of PE for every semester they are enrolled in a NY high school; AND
- enroll in PE every semester they are in a NY high school through their senior year or 8th semester.

Question from You ENL Credit



Can a school or district choose not to grant credit for ENL class?

The school principal is responsible for assessing the curricular content of the courses being delivered in the school and awarding course credits required for conferring a diploma. The principal would need to determine what the learning outcomes of each specific course are in terms of what the students will be expected to learn and do in order to determine if the course would be credit bearing. To bear credit, the learning outcomes would need to be aligned with the high school learning standards.

Admission to a Regents Exam

Section 8.2 of the Rules of the Board of Regents:



• All students who had the opportunity to complete the course of study leading to a Regents Exam have the right to be admitted to that exam.




• Students may not be barred from an exam for disciplinary reasons or because their achievement in a subject is considered unsatisfactory.



• In the case of a science Regents Exam, only students who have also met the laboratory requirement, which includes 1,200 minutes of laboratory experience with satisfactory laboratory reports, may be admitted.



CTE Pathway

To earn the CTE Pathway to a diploma, students must:

- Successfully complete a NYSEDapproved CTE program; and
- Earn a passing score on the program's 3-part technical assessment



Multiple Roles of CDOS

CDOS as a Pathway to a Diploma

Student:

- earns 22 units of credit
- passes four required assessments (one in each discipline)
- successfully completes all the CDOS Commencement Credential requirements

CDOS in Addition to a Diploma

Student:

- earns 22 units of credit
- passes four required assessments (one in each discipline)
- completes a pathway other than CDOS
- successfully completes all the CDOS Commencement Credential requirements

CDOS as a Stand-alone Exiting Credential

Student:

- attempts, but does not successfully complete all the Regents or local diploma requirements
- completes all the CDOS CommencementCredential requirements





* A student can appeal one Regents exam score within 5 points of passing and still receive a Regents Diploma. Special appeals and exemptions can be applied to any diploma type.





Exemptions from Assessments due to COVID

Students granted an exemption from any examination are not required to pass such specific examination to meet the assessment requirements for any diploma type (local, Regents, or Regents with advanced designation). Exemptions remain with students through graduation.



Special Appeals

Any student who meets the following eligibility conditions may appeal to earn a diploma with a lower score on a Regents Exam.

- Regents Exam taken:
 - June/August 2022, or
 - January/June/August 2023;
- Earned a score of 50-64 on the Regents Exam that is the subject of the appeal and was taken during one of the above administrations; and
- Passed the course for which the appeal is being sought (excluding earned Regents Exam score).






Traditional Appeals

To be eligible for a traditional appeal, students must have:

- taken the Regents Exam under appeal at least two times;
- earned at least one score within the point range appropriate for the appeal:
 - All student appeal → 60-64
 - Students with disabilities seeking the local diploma
 → 52-54
 - English language learners seeking appeals in ELA only → 55-59;
- taken advantage of academic help provided by the school in the subject tested by the Regents Exam under appeal; and
- passed the course for which the appeal is being sought.



Diplomas via Traditional Appeal for All Students

Regents Diploma via Appeal for All Students

- Meets credit requirements
- Meets assessment requirements using one successfully appealed Regents Exam score no more than 5 points below passing (60-64)

Local Diploma via Appeal for All Students

- Meets credit requirements
- ✓ Meets assessment requirements using two successfully appealed Regents Exam scores no more than 5 points below passing (60-64)





Local Diploma via **Traditional Appeal** for ELLs

- ✓ Meets credit requirements
- Meets assessment requirements using one successfully appealed English Language Arts Regents Exam score of 55-59
- ✓ May also use one successfully appealed Regents Exam score no more than 5 points below passing (60-64)

Safety Net Options for Students with Disabilities

Local Diploma via Low Pass Safety Net

- Meets credit requirements
- Meets assessment requirements by achieving a score between 55 and 64 on one or more of the required Regents Exams
- May also appeal up to two Regents Exam scores between 52-54



Local Diploma via Compensatory Safety Net

Allows eligible students to meet assessment requirements by compensating Regents Exam scores between 45-54 (on any required Regents Exam except for ELA and math) with a score of 65 or higher on another required Regents Exam

Superintendent Determination of a Local Diploma



Student has a current IEP and is receiving special education programs and/or related services;



Student earned required course credits, including courses to prepare for the required Regents Exams;



Student either satisfied the assessment requirements in ELA and mathematics OR earned the CDOS Commencement Credential;



Student participated in all required Regents Exams but has not passed one or more of those exams;



Student otherwise demonstrated competency in the subject area(s) where they were not able to earn a passing or appealable Regents Exam score; and



Student's parent or person in parental relation submitted a written request to the superintendent for a determination of a local diploma.



Question from You Assessment Requirements



What happens with the student that continues to fail a required regents exam year after year (after attending summer school etc.)?

Once that child gets to the end (senior year and they still continue to fail the exams? What are the options, pathway etc. for them?

General education students are entitled to continue their high school education through the end of the school year in which they turn 21. Since programming and placement decisions are locally determined, the local school district, or BOCES are in the best position to provide information on options for students in their 5th year (or beyond).

Mastery in Mathematics and/or Science

Honors Endorsement

If students have exemptions (due to COVID-19), the calculation for the honors endorsement will be dependent upon the number of scored Regents Examinations the student has.

Minimum of 3 scored Regents Examinations <u>applicable to the diploma</u>

- exemptions due to COVID-19 are removed from the calculation
- computed average of the Regents
 Examination scores required for the diploma (not including exemptions) must equal 90 or above

Students with fewer than three scored Regents Examinations <u>applicable to the diploma</u>

- student's final course grade for each exempted Regents Examination will be substituted in the calculation for honors
- computed average of the scored Regents Examinations and the final course grades for courses for which exemptions were granted must equal 90 or above

Mastery Endorsement

Students may earn the Mastery in Mathematics and/or Science endorsement(s) if the student meets the requirements for a Regents Diploma with Advanced Designation and:

- passes 3 math and/or 3 science Regents Examinations with a score of 85 or better; or
- passes 2 math and/or 2 science Regents Examinations with a score of 85 or better and has been granted an exemption on a third math and/or science Regents Examination; or
- passes 1 math and/or 1 science Regents Examination with an 85 or better and has earned a final course grade of 85 or better in 2 additional math and/or science courses culminating in a Regents Examination for which they were granted an exemption.



Awarding Transfer Credit

Registered NYS High Schools

The principal shall grant transfer credit for all credit awarded by any New York State registered public or nonpublic high schools.

State Agencies

The principal shall award transfer credit to any student for credit awarded while the student attended an educational program administered or supervised by a State agency pursuant to Education Law sections 112 and 3202(7) and Parts 116 or 118 of this Title, upon the attestation of the chief administrator of such program.

Other Educational/ Cultural Institutions

The principal, after consultation with relevant faculty, may award transfer credit for work done at other educational and cultural institutions and for work done through independent study. The decision as to whether or not to award transfer credit for work done at educational institutions other than New York State registered high schools shall be based on whether the record indicates that the work is consistent with New York State commencement learning standards and is of comparable scope and quality to that which would have been done in the school awarding the credit.

Out-of-State Transfer Student Exemptions

Students who enter a registered NYS high school for the first time in **grade 11** or who re-enter after having been enrolled for 3 or fewer semesters in a NYS high school, may be exempt from the Global History and Geography Regents* and may meet the assessment requirements for a Regents diploma by passing the Regents exams in:

ELA

1 Math

1 Science

US History

Students who enter a registered NYS high school for the first time in **grade 12** or who re-enter after having been enrolled for 3 or fewer semesters in a NYS high school, may be exempt from the Global History and Geography Regents* and the science Regents and may meet the assessment requirements for a Regents diploma by passing the Regents exams in:

ELA

1 Math

US History

* The Principal may also exempt these students from the two units of credit requirement in global history and geography by substituting two units of credit in social studies.

Interstate Compact: Assessment Flexibility



Exams Required for Graduation in the Sending State

Where the principal from the sending school attests in writing that the student achieved a satisfactory score on such exam(s) and met the proficiency standards for the course(s) assessed in the sending state

National Norm Referenced Achievement Tests

Where the principal from the sending school attests in writing that the student achieved a score equal to or greater than the national grade equivalent corresponding to the typically administered Regents Examination grade



End of Course Local Assessments

Where the principal of the sending school accepted course credit for a course that would typically culminate in an examination required for graduation in New York State

Where the principal from the sending school attests in writing that the student has achieved a score on such assessment that meets the proficiency standards for the course

Question from You Student Records



How do we proceed when a student comes to NYS from another country without a transcript?

While the district should continue to try to obtain official records, in the absence of such, they may award transfer credit based on any evidence of course/grade level completion and proficiency (i.e., placement tests, interviews, reviews of unofficial records such as records kept by the parents, etc.).



CDOS Exiting Credential

- Available to all students
- Student attempts, but does not successfully complete all the New York State diploma requirements
- Student completes all the CDOS
 Commencement Credential requirements
 - Option 1 or Option 2
- Credential shall be issued any time after such student has attended school for at least 12 years, excluding kindergarten, or has received a substantially equivalent education elsewhere, or at the end of the school year in which a student attains the age of 21





Skills & Achievement Commencement Credential

- Available to Students with Disabilities assessed using the NYS Alternate Assessment
- Must be accompanied by documentation of the students' skills and strengths and levels of independence in academic, career development and foundation skills needed for post-school living, learning and working
- The credential may be issued at any time after such student has attended school for at least 12 years, excluding kindergarten, or has received a substantially equivalent education elsewhere, or at the end of the school year in which a student attains the age of 21

A student must either:

- earn the <u>Seal of Civic Readiness</u>; or
- pass an additional Regents Exam or Department Approved Alternative in a different course (English, mathematics, science, or social studies); or
- · pass a Department Approved Pathway Assessment (Arts, CDOS, World Languages); or
- · successfully complete a NYSED-approved CTE program, including the associated 3-part technical assessment; or
- . successfully complete all the requirements for earning the CDOS Commencement Credential.

Beginning in fall 2022, a select number of NYS schools will pilot the <u>Individual Arts Assessment Pathway (IAAP)</u>. Reference <u>Multiple Pathways</u> and <u>Department Approved Alternative Examinations</u>.

2.) Traditional Appeals

All appeals are subject to local district approval. Reference: Appeals, Safety Nets, and Superintendent Determination

3.) Special Endorsements

Honors: A student earns a computed average of at least 90 on the Regents Exams applicable to either a Regents diploma or a Regents diploma with advanced designation. No more than 2 Department approved alternatives can be substituted for Regents Exams. The locally developed Checkpoint B examination in World Languages is not included in the calculation.

Mastery in Math and/or Science: A student meets all the requirements for a Regents diploma with advanced designation AND earns a score of 85 or better on 3 math Regents Exams and/or 3 science Regents Exams.

Technical Endorsement: A student meets the requirements for either a local diploma, a Regents diploma or a Regents diploma with advanced designation AND successfully completes a Department approved CTE program including the 3-nart technical assessment.

Seal of Biliteracy: A student meets the criteria for earning the NYS Seal of Biliteracy.

Seal of Civic Readiness: A student meets the criteria for earning the NYS Seal of Civic Readiness.

World Languages Exemption

Students with a disability may be excused from the required units of credit in World Languages if so indicated on their IEP, but they must still earn 22 units of credit to graduate. Such student who seeks a Regents diploma with advanced designation does NOT have to complete the 5-unit sequence in the Arts or CTE in lieu of the sequence in World Languages in order to meet the assessment requirements for the advanced diploma.

5.) Superintendent Determination of a Local Diploma

Students with a disability who are unable to attain a local diploma through the various safety net provisions may be eligible for a Superintendent Determination of a local diploma under certain conditions. Reference: Appeals_Safety Nets, and Superintendent Determination

5.) Flexibilities due to the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency

Exemptions: Students granted an exemption from any exam due to COVID-19 are not required to pass such specific exam to meet the assessment requirements for any diploma type. Reference the following FAQs: <a href="https://

Special Appeals: Eligible students may use lower scores (50-64) on Regents Exams taken during the 2021-22 or 2022-23 school year to meet the assessment requirements for any diploma type. Reference: Special Appeals Memo and FAQ.

Special Determination: Students who are scheduled to graduate in June 2022 and either do not qualify for a Special Appeal o who are unable to participate in one or more required Regents Exam(s) because of illness, including isolation restrictions due to COVID, may request a Special Determination to Graduate with a Local Diploma in June 2022.

.) Exemptions from the Regents Exam in US History and Government (Framework)

Eligible students shall be granted an exemption from the June 2022, August 2022, or January 2023 Regents Exam in US History and Government (Framework). Reference: FAQ on Cancellation of Regents Exam in US History and Government (Framework)




