2019 Summer Programs

Agriculture

Our first module began at the Cornell Cooperative Extension Learning Farm in Canton, where students got a big-picture view of all the ways it's possible to participate in agriculture. Students were able to see a hoof-trimmer at work, churned cream into butter, and toured a working sugar shack.

Down the road, at the St. Lawrence University Sustainability Farm, students learned about the different strategies farmers can use to preserve natural resources for the next generation. Students planted a pollinator-friendly wildflower garden, as well as clover that will serve as a cover crop.

Forestry

For our second module, we traveled to Wanakena, home of the SUNY-ESF Ranger School. After an individualized tour of the campus, students explored the Arboretum, where they learned to identify a wide variety of Adirondack tree species using leaves, pinecones, and other characteristics. Students then joined the Ranger School staff on a short hike to Cathedral Rock, where they were able to climb a classic fire tower and enjoy commanding views of the surrounding mountains and forests
